Why are you running for office?

How can we improve school safety?

As a mother, nothing concerns me more than making sure my kids are safe when they leave my care. I have observed vulnerabilities in school safety first hand. First, due to years of funding cuts, some schools lack secure entry points and locking interior doors. Second, and again due to funding cuts, our school counselors are overloaded, leaving them unable deliver mental health services to students. Finally, gun violence is now a crime of opportunity. Background check loopholes need to be closed, and individuals who are predictably violent should not be allowed to possess firearms.

Georgia has one of the highest health uninsured rates in the nation. The impact of this is particularly felt in rural communities, where local hospitals have been shut down and sick people go without care. Stories of untreated disease are heartbreaking. Yet Georgia has chosen to forgo billions of federal dollars to expand Medicaid, which in addition to improving healthcare, could have spurred economic development and jobs. I propose that Georgia expand Medicaid, to not only include a larger population of low-income families, but also to include a public option buy-in for anyone who lacks coverage.
